
Increased visibility re crime/ASB at identified locations

- It was remarked that the new Southend Borough Council Community Safety Team had already been seen out in the area.

Information Shared

Drugs Activity

- Eastwood Park/Hudson Crescent still issues of drugs activity, although they had reduced. Patrols were seen frequently in the area.
- Alley Ways between Prince Avenue and Hampton Gardens ongoing drugs activity.
- Drugs activity was mentioned in Blatches Chase area.

ASB

- Baryta Court, Rectory Grove general ASB
- North Street Car Park/Broadway General ASB/Youths doing wheelie's
- St Lawrence Park inconsiderate driving and ASB
- Morrison's car park. There were ongoing issues with ASB including inconsiderate driving and drugs activity. Morrisons had been approached by

- the resident but appeared disinterested. There appeared to be CCTV overlooking the car park.
- Belfairs there were two horse riders, mainly at weekend, on the golf course who were riding too fast and were abusive. PS Knights would speak to lan Brown at the Council who was already aware of the issue.

Crime

- Vehicles had been broken into along the roads between Manners Way and Nestuda Way. An individual had been seen going and trying car doors.
- Belfairs there was concern at the number of burglaries in the area.

Don't forget your 9pm checks – windows, doors, car doors – make sure they are all locked

REMINDER: Reports / updates of problems regarding rough sleepers should be communicated to ward councillors, to ensure that SBC is fully aware of situation. All reports of rough sleepers should be made via the national 'Streetlink' organisation, who act as the first point of contact for SBC.

Don't forget that requests for updates / information / answers should be Emailed to Simon Werrett at least 7 days prior to a meeting, to enable the necessary research to be undertaken and an appropriate response prepared.

REMINDER:

As Spring starts and the warmer weather arrives

- Make your home safe and secure by fitting 5 lever mortise locks on all external doors and secure locks on all other doors and windows.
- Install a burglar alarm.
- Lock and secure all windows and doors when you leave your home take special care with UPVC doors (lift handle and lock door with key).
- Remove keys from locks and place them out of sight.
- Never leave tools or implements outside the property which thieves can use to forcibly enter your home.
- Use automatic light timers / sensors to make your property look occupied and consider leaving a radio on. This is especially important on the dark evenings.

Don't leave valuables on view in an unoccupied vehicle

- Photograph and record serial numbers of valuable items (laptops, computer consoles, satellite navigation systems, TV's etc.), use an ultra violet marker pen to security code your property, to assist with later identification.
- Ensure that vehicle is locked / secure and that all valuable items are removed / hidden from view.

If you are fortunate to go away to warmer climates

 Do not advertise that you are away – ask a trusted person to check on your property and remove mail. Cancel milk & newspaper deliveries. Ensure light timers and burglar / fire alarms are working.

Knock, Knock Who is there....

 Suspect callers should never be admitted to your property – always check identification and if necessary verify with a telephone call to the agency concerned. If you are still concerned call for advice from friends / relatives / Police. Remember that opportunist burglars usually knock on doors to check whether the premises are occupied and may use an excuse by asking for a named person. If you are unsure close the door and ring for assistance.
